AMENDED DECREE DETERMINING HEIRSHIP

New on this 13th day of May, A., 1953, this matter came on for hearing on the amended petition of Lawrence V. Anderson, for the determination of heirship in the Estate of Adolph A. John, deceased, and was submitted to the Court.

It appearing from the records and files in said matter that notice of the time and place fixed for hearing on said petition has been given by publication thereof, as by the order of said Court heretofore made and entered, whereupon the evidence was considered.

On consideration of the evidence the Court finds that the said Adolph A. John died on the 4th day of May, 1944, intestate, and that the said Adolph A. John was at the time of his death a resident and inhabitant of Hall County, Nebraska, and that in addition to the property set forth in the original decree herein, the said Adolph A. John died seized and possessed of Lot Fourteen (14) Geer's Subdivision to the City of Grand Island, Hall County, Nebraska; that more than two (2) years have elapsed since the date of the death of the said Adolph A. John, and no application for the appointment of an administrator in his Estate has been made in this State by any heirs or persons claiming to be creditors of said deceased. That the said Adolph A. John also known as George A. Johns and a daughter, Helen Morigeau and a widow, Arlie M. John, who was not the mother of the aforementioned children; that all of the said heirs are of legal age and are the sale and only heirs of his Estate. That the value of the said Estate does not exceed the sum of \$1,000.00, and that noither said astate nor any portion of it is subject to inheritance tax.

If IS, THEREFORE, CONSIDERED, ORDERED AND ADJUDGED that said Lot Fourteen [1].) Geer's Subdivision to the City of Grand Island, Hall County, Nebraska, be and the same hereby is, assigned as follows: one-fourth (\frac{1}{2}) to the widow, Arlie M. John, and three-fourths (3/h) to Helen Morigeau and George A. John, also known as George A. Johns.
