. The Court further finds that the said John Dohrn was the owner at the time of his death of the following described real estate, to-wit:

The Southerly 74.8 feet of Let Im (10), in Plock Sixteen (18), in Passel Theoler's Addition to the City of Grand Island, Hall County, Nebraska;

which had a fair market value of the sun of Five Thousand Bollars, and which was the home and homestead of the eatd John Dohrn and wife, Mary Dohrn, and has heretofore been set off unto her as her homestead.

The Court further finds that there was no other preperty of the said John Bohrn left by him at the time of his death, either real or personal.

The Court further fin's that the expenses of the last illness and funeral expenses have been pid in full; that the gross value of the catate of any and all natures whatevever subject to taxation did not exceed the sum of \$5000.00; that there could not by any possibility be any Federal Setate Tax or State Inheritance Tax.

The Court further finds that there have been no claims filed in this estate; that the time fixed for filing claims has long since elapsed; that notice of the time fixed for filing claims has been given in the manner and form provided by law.

IT IS, THEREFORE, ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED BY THE COURT that all claims not now on file be and the came are hereby foreser barred.
